## Honoring Losses Leads to Blessings


When this all began last year, a question I never thought I would be asking is "How do I administer ashes on Ash Wednesday and maintain a 6 ft distance?" The answer our wise Deacons responded with was, "You don't."

There are some parts of our lives which just cannot be modified and still maintain the integrity of the ritual. Yes, we could do ashes-to-go, you could pick up ashes in a cup from church, you could make your own (ashes and olive oil...never use water!). We could find a modification that would work well enough, but there are also times in our lives when we are meant to stop, take a deep breath, and leave space to grieve a loss. Lent has always been that time.

In the season of Lent, we are reminded that after he was baptized, Jesus went straight into the wilderness for 40 days to pray. In the wilderness, he experienced the loss of food, the loss of power to rule nations, the loss of ego to do whatever he wanted without consequence. The story goes that the Tempter offered him all of these things, but Jesus denied them all and let a loss be a loss. And after sitting in loss after loss for 40 days, the angels came and waited on him.

Honoring losses often results in unexpected blessings. We experience this most intentionally at funerals when we honor the deceased and discover the blessing of celebrating their life. Giving time to honor a loss without rushing to replace it, opens our minds to witness life right in front of us. This year although we will not be putting ashes on our foreheads or have Lenten Soup Suppers, we will let those be holy losses, we are presented with an unexpected blessing to have all of our Wednesday Lenten worship services be larger than they have ever been. This year, we are partnering with numerous other local churches to encounter Jesus exactly where we are...at home, at school, at work, in nature, in our day-to-day life.


- Where all are unconditionally welcomed, affirmed, accepted and loved;

I want to start off the New Year by extending thanks and appreciation for the support and participation in "Sponsor a Sunday" in 2020. Our committee is amazed and so proud to report to you that 22 Sunday worship services were sponsored last year, only slightly down from the 24 sponsored worship services in 2019 – the first year for this initiative. Considering the pandemic and necessary move to many services having to be online, this says so much about the members of UCC and their love for this church. This year the Stewardship and Mission Committee again invites members to participate in Sponsor a Sunday.

You are also invited to participate in the 2021 pledge drive. The pledge drive was kicked off in November 2020. The level of participation to date falls short of last year so please consider making a pledge for this year. It's not too late.

The committee will be exploring a matching grant opportunity available through the Northern Plains Conference of the United Church of Christ. Up to \$500 per church is available starting now through Easter, to use in showing support for frontline workers as COVID-19 continues. From medical workers to first responders, teachers and chaplains, these matching funds may be used for an act of kindness for a particular group of our choosing either as a one-time event or a recurring project that extends over time. 

## Pretzels and Lent

You might be wondering what pretzels have to do with Lent? The word *Pretzel* comes from a German word that means “little arms”. The twisted shape of the pretzel is meant to remind us of arms crossed in prayer, and Lent is a season of prayer. Pretzels became popular because they required very few ingredients as the first pretzels were made with only flour, salt, and water. During the 7<sup>th</sup> century, Christians were strict about what they could eat during the season of Lent. The simple ingredients of pretzels were perfect for their fasting.

Below is a simple pretzel recipe to try making with your family as the Lenten season starts as a way to remember and talk about the meaning of Lent and a reminder to pray.


Just like arms  
folded,  
My **pretzel** will  
stay.

To **PRAY** everyday.



## Homemade Soft Pretzel Recipe (8 servings)

1 ½ c water, warm  
1 tbs salt  
1 tbs sugar  
1 packet active dry yeast  
coarse salt

4 ½ c flour  
3 tbs oil, divided  
2/3 c baking soda  
2 eggs, beaten



### Preparation

1. In a bowl, mix water, salt, and sugar until combined. Add yeast, and let rest 5 minutes until yeast starts to foam.
2. Add flour and 2 tablespoons of oil, and mix thoroughly until a dough forms.
3. Remove the dough and use the remaining oil to cover the bowl.
4. Cover bowl with plastic wrap, and leave in a warm place for 1 hour.
5. Preheat oven to 450°F (230°C).
6. Cut dough into 8 pieces and roll them out into thin ropes, twisting the two ends to form a pretzel shape.
7. Add baking soda to a large pot of water, and bring to a rolling boil. Boil each pretzel for 30 seconds per side.
8. Transfer pretzels to a baking sheet, brush with egg wash, and sprinkle with salt. Bake for 10-15 minutes, until golden brown.
