Prayer Space on Election Night

We have been living in the midst of a crisis for most of 2020. Despite the fact that we may now be use to wearing masks and physical distancing, I know that the stress of unsettled social norms and living in a pandemic continues to take a toll on each of you. Some of you have loved ones who are ill or who are continuing to experience lasting effects of COVID-19 on their health. Towards the end of last month, our church family and community experienced the immense economic effects of the pandemic first hand when the residential program at Charles Hall Youth and Family Services closed its doors. For the past few months, your mailboxes have been flooded with campaign ads and on November 3, we will experience one of the most divided Presidential Elections in our lives.

When our faith ancestors were living in times of ongoing stress and crisis, they turned to God in prayer through song and poetry. It is out of periods of crisis that we get the books of Lamentations, Psalms, and many others. On **Tuesday, November 3 from 7pm – 9pm**, we are offering a prayer space for you to intentionally engage in prayer on election night after the polls close. This will be a space to disconnect from technology and news, sit on holy ground, offer prayers, and intentionally be in the presence of God. This will be an open time during which you can come and go as it best fits your spiritual and emotional needs. Written prayers and a finger labyrinth will be provided in the bulletin for you to use as you wish. We hope it is a space for you to center yourselves in your identities as children of God and bearers of love even in the midst of difficult times.

Remember even beyond election night, that if you are feeling stressed or anxious, you are not alone. Your church family is here for you. Individuals are at the church ready to reach out with weekly or monthly phone calls. I am available by phone, text, email, or video conferencing. There are free tools and professionals at your disposal to help you manage the stress of these times. Despite needing to physically distance, you do not need to be socially isolated. Charles Hall Residential Program Comes to an End

On Saturday, October, 24, Charles Hall Youth and Family Services closed its Qualified Residential Treatment Program (QRTP) due to major funding shortages in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic. Although the residential program has closed, Charles Hall continues to operate with limited staff as the agency researches new programming opportunities. The youth unable to return to legal guardians have been moved to Home on the Range in Beach, ND or Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch in Minot and Fargo.

At the beginning of 2020, North Dakota had five QRTP agencies serving foster care children and families across the state. With Charles Hall closing its residential program, North Dakota now has only two QRTP facilities to serve foster care children and families struggling with major mental health and behavioral issues, as well as substance abuse and poverty. CHYFS has responded to the needs of over 5,000 at-risk youth from across North Dakota since 1965 and was founded as a mission of the United Church of Christ.

Testimony from Former Charles Hall Youth



I'm Rosabel and I went into Charles Hall when I was 13 and 14 for 10 months. Without Charles Hall I wouldn't have become who I am today because they helped me with a lot. The staff gave me a great support system and made me realize that I wasn't a bad person I just made mistakes and that I could still be who I wanted to be.

After Charles Hall, I was put into a foster home and they actually became my forever family. I graduated high school and I now work in politics. I'm a regional manager for a political consulting firm and for most of the

year I travel around the country working on campaigns and get bills and laws put on the ballot.

Dear Friends,

In these days of 'soft openings' and 'smart restarts' I sometimes lie awake and wonder how we help the people we serve start again.

How do we help the 34 year old woman who had her first child at age 13, and the next at 15? With only a 9th grade education, she has spent the ensuing years raising her children, her extended family, and now is primary caretaker for her mother.

How do we help the 50 year old man who started drinking with his dad at age 11? It is as if his maturation froze at that age and now he is learning skills and paths of relationship more appropriate for an independent adult?

How do we help the family that has expanded their household to include 3 more adults and 6 children because of pandemic-related unemployment?

While I struggle with the questions, you have been part of the solution through your donation of \$1200.00. Thank you.

We continue to adjust our food pantry for safety and increasing household size, while retaining the laughter, ice cream treats, and community energy with which we have always been known. We have started Open Hours twice a week in which social workers, NDSU and UMary Nursing Students, and other professionals can help people complete the myriad applications required for housing, employment, child support, educational assistance.

We have started a Women's Spirituality Group called *Hearts of Welcome* in which we offer childcare and transportation.

We are creatively reaching out to the prison and jail, collaborating with our local police department, providing emergency sheltering, and taking food and prayer out to the streets while maintaining safety for ourselves and our vulnerable populations as priority.

Thank you for making all this possible through your financial and prayerful support. We pray for you daily. We are here for you if you or your family are ever in need. We are humbly grateful that you have chosen to be partners with us in caring for others.
