### What's It Like?

As more of our members are receiving a COVID vaccination, I have been asked more often, "What is it like at church?" I know some of you, or your family members, are counting down the days until after your vaccination and are preparing to venture back to in-person worship.

#### So what is it like to worship in-person on Sundays?

It is like being in community with your church family, but with masks and social distancing. Every other pew is roped off and masks are required inside the church building. When you enter, a table is set up with hand sanitizer and bulletins. Everyone picks up their own bulletin and finds a seat in the sanctuary. Sealed communion cups are in every pew for Communion Sundays and the offering "plate" is located by the sanctuary doors. After worship, I or ushers invite people to exit the sanctuary one pew at a time to prevent a bottleneck at the doors.

#### When will policies change and how will I know?

Council meets monthly to review our COVID policies. During each review, our Council considers the recommendations of the ND Department of Health, the local infection rates, the impact of our current policies on preventing viral spread and promoting healthy faith lives, the practices of other faith communities in the area, and the question of how we can best be a safe and nurturing environment for the most vulnerable among us. At major turning points in infection rates, Council has also consulted with infection control specialists for recommendations specific to our setting. Updates and a full history of changes can be found on our website at www.uccbismarck.org/covid-19.

In February, Council voted to keep our in-person & online worship policies the same, but reopen the fellowship hall for small group meetings. The next Council meeting is Monday, March 8 at 5:30pm. I commend our Council members for bravely taking on this difficult task, setting aside politics, and striving to make the healthiest decisions possible for our congregation. 
## One Great Hour of Sharing

One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) special mission offering of the UCC involves you in disaster, refugee/immigration, and development ministries throughout the world. When a disaster strikes or people are

displaced or made refugees by violence or extreme poverty, you are part of the immediate response and of the long-term recovery.

How far would you be willing to go so that your family would have water? The prophet Isaiah declares that God's people will neither hunger nor thirst, and yet some families are walking up to 12 miles per day to get water. Often times water they collect is contaminated, therefore making them sick after all of the effort they have expelled to retrieve the water. A solar-powered borehole well and water system can change all of that. With the creation of water kiosks, families can pay a nominal fee to get water and eliminate long trips to contaminated sources; and area services such as schools and hospitals are immensely helped as well. The journey for clean water begins with you. Send or bring your OGHS to the church before Palm Sunday, March 28<sup>th</sup>.


on paper to be burned. Palm leaves were dried and burned with these papers.

# **2021:** A Time to Pivot AND Begin a New Chapter IN THE Life and Legacy of Charles Hall

The COVID-19 pandemic took its toll on Charles Hall's Qualified Residential Treatment Program in the final quarter of 2020, as staff and staff family members began to experience COVID-19 directly. The end of October, the agency ceased its residential program and secured placements for youth in care. It was a difficult and sad time for all, but it was a decision that had to be made at that time.

Today, Charles Hall Youth and Family Services is still operating with five staff persons (full-time and part-time) and our agency's board of directors. Our 501(c) 3 status remains active. Charitable gifts continue to be requested and are receipted for donors' tax purposes.

Controlled liquidation of items that are no longer needed is well underway. Liquidation of selected assets will assist the agency in meeting its remaining financial obligations related to residential treatment program operations. The agency plans for additional funding support with individual donor gifts, limited federal aid, and eventually major grant funding as the agency transitions from its roots in residential care into the future.

Potential New Strategies for Serving At-Risk Children and Families Agency leadership is in the process of pursuing a new focus that builds on the most recent history of the past 16 years, along with the organization's longer-term history of almost six decades of service to at-risk children.

With renewed focus, we directors are considering strategic new ways to reach children with effective, deliverable programming based on Charles Hall's well-tested and research-based approach to self-esteem and moral development. Strengthening emotional resiliency and psychological security for all children, especially for those children facing challenges created by abuse, neglect, and complex trauma remains core to the work.

The agency remains dedicated to the development and dissemination of programming in the affective domain — specifically, instructional programming to equip children with the knowledge, skills, attitudes, and behaviors needed to ensure emotional stability and psychological security. During the past two decades, Charles Hall has been committed to strength-based and trauma-informed practices as the agency designed unique programming to support youths' moral development, their development of integrity and character, emotional intelligence, and the psychological construct of self-esteem.

Moving forward, Charles Hall will work to pivot to continue these efforts and reach beyond residential foster care to assist children and families in new venues using different methods (e.g., technology) and building expanded partnerships. North Dakota educational institutions that have expressed interest in working with Charles Hall in 2021 include Fargo Public Schools, United Tribes Technical College, and Bismarck State College.

#### **Current State of Foster Care in North Dakota**

During the past three years, foster care in North Dakota has experienced great change. With this change, residential programming, except for psychiatric treatment facilities, is limited and no longer a significant part of the continuum of care for high risk youth in the state's

foster care system. In addition, funding streams have changed greatly with the majority of dollars now allocated to "zones" in place of North Dakota's former county system.

#### **Next Steps**

Charles Hall has a unique and influential history. Those who have gone before us have left a legacy that leadership staff is confident can continue. With the next six months, the agency will continue to face uncertainties with the COVID-19 pandemic. However, with controlled liquidation, securing underwriting to address current financial obligations (e.g., PPP funding and charitable support from committed donors), and intentional inquiry and strategic planning, the co-executive directors are confident that the agency will see clearly a path to an expanded future or how the agency will bring its work to an ultimate close.

The directors remain committed to Charles Hall Youth and Family Services. With faith and trust in God, as well as a great deal of hard work and continued commitment, Charles Hall can move forward to do great things.
